Why rescue???? I guess my answer to that is a simple "why not"?

My name is Jody and I am the Foster Coordinator for the group. I joined Schnauzer Rescue Cincinnati in October 2008. When I lost my 15 year old schnauzer, Chelsea, in September 2008 to cancer, I thought my world had ended. However, I had adopted another rescued schnauzer, Bailey, prior to Chelsea passing, knowing that this would happen someday. Bailey was such a comfort to me through the grieving process.

A few months later I was on the Schnauzer Rescue Cincinnati website and was just looking at all of the schnauzers that were in foster care that needed to



be adopted. I thought to myself, why don't I help out dogs in need? I didn't think twice about contacting Pat Miller to volunteer to transport schnauzers for SRC. I started by pulling schnauzers from our local animal shelter and transporting them halfway to Cincinnati. After a while, Pat asked me to foster one. I thought it over for some time and then again thought, why not?

I cannot describe the pleasure I get from seeing these little schnauzers blossom into loving, friendly, healthy and socialized companions. All it takes is a little love for the unlucky to turn things around for most of these pups. Most of us can lie down at night near someone we love and know that we belong. Human or animal, it fills us with joy to think that even in our great big world, someone cares. Often we forget about those who feel forgotten themselves. They have no home, and with that, no sense of comfort. Fostering and adoption means more than doing the right thing – it's simply love for the unlucky and the start of a never ending friendship.

Those of us who volunteer in rescue all have at least one rescue dog and we know what terrific pets they can be! Here are some reasons to consider a rescue dog, rather than buying a puppy, if you are ready to add a dog to your family.



- You're not starting from scratch
- Training is easier
- The bond is strong (I believe they know that you are there for them to keep them safe)
- Fewer vet fees (they have already had physical examinations, are already spayed/neutered, up to date on shots, and tested for heartworm)
- It teaches your children good values (adopting a rescue dog teaches your children basic values of compassion and caring, and also the value of second chances)
- What you see is what you get (when you buy a puppy, you can't be sure what type of dog you will get, their adult personalities aren't visible until they're about two years old)

I am happy to say that I have rescued and adopted four schnauzers, three of them being from Schnauzer Rescue Cincinnati. They are all healthy, happy, socialized companions and I would have to say, four out of five of the most important things in my life. One of the other benefits to volunteering with rescue is that you meet so many caring individuals who later on become good friends, whether they are members of the group, foster parents, transporters, or adoptive parents.

Not only does he look like he could be Ringo's brother, but that sweet face was too much to resist! How no one had wanted Zippy is beyond us. He can do anything a normal dog can do, does not seem limited in the least other than tiring out a little guicker. He loves to run up and down the stairs, chase the cats and give us a good workout on the leash. Watching him go about life with such a happy and positive attitude despite his handicap is worth more than gold. He is already teaching us life lessons and is such an inspiration. We are absolutely in love and so smitten with Zippy! He was adjusted into the house in a matter of hours, even our indoor cats were fascinated and excited, and he was so respectful and gentle around our old girl Nikki. He has done so well that we have yet to crate him when we are gone. Zip has made fast friends with all our family, neighbors and their dogs too, charming them when he comes up, stands on his two back legs and sticks his one good leg on you for a hug! He is my constant shadow, cannot stand for me to be out of sight. And an even better thing was we discovered Zippy has a secret passion for howling! That tickled us like crazy as one of our best



dogs, Titus, another schnauzer mix who died of old age at 14, was quite the crooner.

Unfortunately, about three weeks after we brought Zippy home, we had to help Nikki to the Rainbow Bridge. It was devastating to both of us to lose our old friend of so many years. It was the best thing for her but our hearts felt like they were breaking. But somehow that heartache has eased, much in part to Zippy. 

Newspapers, Craigslist, and flea market vendors with a big cardboard box advertise the same thing. "FREE TO GOOD HOME". But is this really "FREE"??

There are several reasons why this is not such a good deal, both for potential owners and the pet.

From the pet's point of view:

Before you decide to give away your pet to any stranger, consider some of the people that answer these ads:

- People who train dogs for fighting
- People who sell animals for research
- People that need to feed large exotic animals
- Unscrupulous breeders
- People involved in cults

Giving a pet away for free is misguided. People tend not to value what they don't pay for. If you charge

even a nominal amount for an animal, the new owner is more likely to take their commitment more seriously. A free pet is a disposable pet!!! Paying a fee for a pet demonstrates their willingness to properly care for the animal. Free animals may be abandoned, neglected, abused or worse.

As a prospective pet owner:

Why is "FREE" bad for you? People who would give so little concern for the pet probably have very little concern for their health as well. It is very likely that the furface you just took home has heartworm, parvo, distemper, feline leukemia, feline HIV, etc. which in the long run could cost you thousands of dollars, if they survive the ordeal.

Secondly, your "FREE" pet has probably not had any basic veterinary care. At Schnauzer Rescue Cincinnati, your new pet will be neutered/spayed, de-wormed (if necessary), heartworm tested, rabies vaccinated, examined by a veterinarian and if any illnesses are present, we will incur the medical expenses to treat the pet before he or she can be adopted.

Now that you see how valuable the included services are, don't you agree that "FREE ISN'T REALLY FREE?" Our adoption fee not only includes numerous services, it also includes "PEACE OF MIND".

Paws and Tails – Henrietta A tribute as written by Tom and Ann Bess King



She came from one of those terrible Missouri puppy mills along with two other Schnauzer girls. Rescued by St. Louis Senior Dog Project, their founder Ellen named the girls Henrietta, Heidi, and Hilde.

My hubby Tom and I headed to PetCo for one of the weekend adoption events that SLSDP did every week. The intent was to help with fostering and rehabilitating a Schnauzer. Ellen told us that Henrietta was the bravest of the three girls and that she was between 5-7 years old.

The first time we saw her – I was shocked – if this was the bravest – what must the other two be like. Henrietta was scared, skinny, and had that vacant stare that you see sometimes in dogs that have been abused or neglected. She stood frozen in one spot – not sure of what to do and without any understanding of what that leash thing was.

Thus began our saga with Henrietta. Hubby held her at PetCo for about an hour – then off we went – to try to help this pitiful little girl by taking her into our home and helping her learn to trust and feel safe for the first time in her life.

The first few weeks, all Henrietta wanted - was to be held. So Tom did just that. Held her, petted her, kissing her head and talking softly to her. She soon seemed to realize that she was safe, that meals were regular, and that she didn't have to constantly look over her shoulder when she was eating. The food would be there!! She soon ventured around the various rooms of the house.

After about 3 weeks the folks at STSDP told us we would have to bring her to the weekly adoption events – so she could find a home. Too late!! She had already found her home. She officially became a part of the Bess-King Gang. During a visit to our family vet we were told however that Henrietta was more likely between 8-10 years old. No matter to us.

She was developing a personality and settling into her own routine. It was such a joy to see her come out of her shell. She even got us trained well! If feeding time was a little late, she would march up and down the hall, "woo-wooing" to let us know – where's my plate??

Her greatest pleasure was watching out the bay window for cars – then fussing at them as they passed, barking and sometimes pawing at the window. She

liked to take her daily walk in the back yard, wandering the whole perimeter of the yard, looking for just that perfect spot! She had a funny little hop when she first went out each day she'd fly out the door, down the steps and "hop" across the yard.

One of my saddest thoughts – early on – was when she found a chewy in the yard that one of the other fur kids had drug out. She tried her best to chew it, tossing it in the air and bouncing it off the walk. You see another result of the neglect at the mill - she had lost most of her teeth. I remember thinking what a shame. She finally had people that would give her all these treats and she couldn't enjoy them. But I needn't have worried - that didn't stop her. She worked her way through greenies, little dingo bones, pork kabobs, and chicken jerky – her favorites.

The next couple of years flew by. She remained hubby's baby, sleeping next to him and sticking close to him. She would bounce up and down when he came home. And all during that time – hubby asked her for



kisses. But she never did that. Some dogs are natural kissers, some you have to ask for a kiss, and some just don't. Henrietta never did that. She would snuggle, but just look at you like you were crazy when you kissed her and asked for one in return.

A couple of months ago, Henrietta started losing weight. She wasn't eating as much and although she always slept a lot, she started sleeping more and more. So – the trip to the vet, lots of test, and the diagnosis – bladder cancer.

New medicine, lots of coaxing to try to get her to eat and then the time came for the follow up visit. I had been worrying for a month already that she might be in pain although she gave no indication of that. Hubby carried her in – she was so weak. The vet said we could try sub-Q fluids but hubby said – no – no more poking. So the vet left the room to ready the shot. It was time to help Henrietta to the Rainbow Bridge.

As we sat there waiting, I asked Tom – are you sure – we could try the fluids. The vet didn't believe she was in much pain, just feeling crappy. Are you sure it's time?? That's when he told me – "yes - it's time" – "she told me this morning." "She gave me a kiss!"

We love you Henrietta and we miss you!

Shirley Murphy has been with Champion Window in Cincinnati, Ohio for 12 years as the Affiliate Service Coordinator. She's also a dedicated, enthusiastic volunteer for Schnauzer Rescue Cincinnati (www.schnauzerrescuecincinnati.org). Shirley herself has fostered and placed over thirty dogs in the mere twelve months she's been a volunteer.

Rescue dogs come from many sources. Some are found on the street, others are given up by owners. They also come from the SPCA and puppy mills that shut down. The group takes in dogs that are healthy and well trained, and also those with health or behavior problems. Shirley and the other volunteers help to rehabilitate and socialize foster dogs so that they're ready to be adopted into "forever homes" with families that love them.

When the dogs are ready for adoption, Shirley and other volunteers showcase the dogs using adoption networks such as Petfinder.com. Shirley, who is an amateur photographer, makes sure the dog has a great photo and a description for the

online ads. It's like a singles ad, she says; personality highlights and nice photos make people want to meet the animals. She also helps to screen potential owners, making sure they understand the responsibility of owning a dog and have a compatible home and lifestyle.

Shirley and the schnauzer rescue encourage people to adopt pets from rescue groups and the SPCA or other animal shelters, not from pet stores. Pet stores can be sneaky about their use of puppy mills - "raised on a ranch" often means raised in a cage on the ranch with irresponsible breeding procedures and poor living conditions. Do your homework before adopting: make sure the animal you choose is right for your lifestyle. Finally, spay or neuter your pets (including cats and rabbits) to help reduce the number of unwanted pets that end up in shelters and, too often, euthanized.


This wasn't her first escapade, as her mom reports...


